

THE ROUND-ILFORD RELAY.

Once again the Belgrave Harriers have proven their capabilities in producing yet another winning team in this year's Ilford Road Relay. Despite adverse weather conditions, the Belgrave boys tore up the Ilford course from start to finish in one long burst of brilliant running.

A stiffish wind was making itself felt as Carter took off on the first relay, but nothing deterred, he went forward to present his team companions with the comfortable margin of a 200 yards lead, and establishing for himself the very pleasing time of 19 min. 25 sec. The challenge was then taken up by F. Webb who, let it be noticed, accomplished the not unfair time of 20 mins., under the handicap of making his own pace. A surprise was created in the third relay in the shape of F. Shields, a junior of no small merit who pulled out a remarkable run in 19 min. 51 sec. The name of this promising lad will not easily be forgotten in the inevitable after-the-race "inquest."

C. Mains ran well with 19 min. 40 sec. to his credit, as also did J. E. Flower, Shaw and A. Taylor, their times being 20 min. 26 sec., 20 min. 38 sec., 20 min. 23 sec. respectively. W. Rice produced some of his old form which, however, was not too aged to enable him to secure the useful time of 19 min. 40 sec. Intense interest was caused in the race by H. E. Footer and A. Penny, two of the club's most prominent men, whose keen but friendly rivalry has always spurred each to greater things. Bounding with his customary zest, Footer made ground with every stride, and it was not surprising to learn that his last year's record was scattered to the four winds, with the vastly improved time of 18 min. 58 sec. to replace it. Last relay, and Penny keyed up to beat his rival at all costs. Running like one possessed, he reached the last quarter mile to the accompaniment of enthusiastic cries from numerous supporters, doing much to urge him on to even greater efforts. What a run! He finished faster than he started, showing the exceptional and almost incredible time of 18 min. 46 sec., thereby smashing the standing record by 4 sec.

Altogether a most satisfying win, marked by many very meritorious individual performances, and a collective effort which

running of a few years back, when he was Club Champion, should greatly strengthen our team. Ring and Saunders again attracted attention by their prominent placings, whilst Frank Tame and H. J. Fletcher also showed that they will have to be considered later in the season.

Mitchell, all of the Bels. Going out towards the village, Cohen of Ashcombe crept up and took the lead when crossing the Golf Links. The runners were now beginning to thin out, but T.V.H. had a good crowd of their men with ours at this point.

Beverley Brook was passed and the Kingsmere reached, and here one of our men, Cecil Mains, went to the front, but appeared to be doubtful of the course. From here to the finish he was pressed by Cohen, who eventually won by a few yards. Well run, Cohen and Mains! Bicknell was the first "Valley" man to finish (9th); but as the Bels. placed their fifteen to score in the first 18 positions, we ran out very easy winners of the race.

Our "Juniors" ran well, and with conscientious training will greatly add to our strength.

H. D. Brown well deserved his handicap win, showing minutes improvement over previous running. Harry Shields, in finishing fifth in the scratch race, deserved some sort of reward for this, probably his best yet, and was placed second in the handicap, with Bill Mitchell, our second man to finish, third, with an allowance of 1 min. 45 sec.

WITH THE WALKERS.

The Winter Season has opened quite successfully for us and we have certainly not gone back on last year's performances. Two of the three opening races have found us taking second place to Enfield A.C. in the scratch team races, but we have no doubt this state of affairs will alter as the season progresses in the same way as it did last year. We have had one winning and two second handicap teams in three races despite rapidly decreasing marks, and this is very satisfactory.

Tommy Green has led the field home once (at Enfield); and finished a creditable second in our own Open event. Len Fletcher has not succeeded in being in the first three yet this season in Open Event, but the New Year should find him back to his old form and all the better for a steady start.

In the individual handicap races H. Latter earned himself distinction (and no doubt a considerably reduced handicap!) by winning our own event, whilst J. G. Coleman did well in taking third prize at Enfield.

Several of our "Juniors" are showing considerably improved form. In particular our "Veteran Junior," Charlie Speechley, calls for attention, as does also A. H. Field. Many others have also improved upon their previous best and the result of our "Junior" Club Championship for the "Horwood" Cup should make interest reading.

THE HIGHGATE HARRIERS' "OPEN."

Very wisely, the Highgate H. decided to promote their race in Regents' Park this year and were rewarded by an excellent entry. Len Fletcher was our first man home, fifth, with Tommy Green eighth. Our team and Enfield A.C. tied for scratch team honours with 57 points each, although we had the satisfaction of finish-

ing seven men (some of them being "B" team members) before the fourth Enfield man finished. The handicap was won by W. A. Sykes (Eastleigh Town S.C.) and his team won the handicap team race which afforded Tommy Green much pleasure, for he has been at great pains to encourage the sport in his home town.

Our "B" team, consisting of Brown, Coleman Latter and C. E. Churcher, were second. Altogether, a successful start to the season. It is unusual for our teams to gain handicap awards in the first race of the season; we usually require a few weeks to settle down, but this year proved an exception.
