THE BRIGHTON RELAY.

An invitation to compete in the "News of the World" Brighton Relay, and the knowledge that it was necessary to avoid the last six places to ensure a run in future years, made a fitting and appreciated end to the Season.

On viewing the entries there seemed a very sporting chance of finishing in the first twelve places but a series of misfortunes decided that this was not to be. J. D. Andrews damaged a leg during the Easter holidays and our reserve experienced a very bad time in the race and lost no fewer than nine places. Actually his time was 2 mins. 22 secs. slower than any other competitor on his stage and this left too much for those following to regain, and proved sufficient to let us down three positions at the finish.

Of an entry of nineteen teams we actually finished fourteenth

It will be found however, that by taking an average of the order of actual placings for each relay, that we came out tenth best, equal with Essex Beagles. This is a fair test, for applying the theory to the other teams, it makes no other variations in the positions except three double inter changes, and places Herne Hill H. fifth, in which position they would doubtless have finished had their last man not collapsed.

The outstanding features of the race were some good running by H. W. Bruce, who was very prominent in the first stage, and J. G. Flatt, who on the long rise up to Merstham surprised all by making second fastest time, beating all but that of the Herne Hill runner.

H. E. Footer had been "honoured" (this he does not admit) with the stiffest part of the race, the hill climbing up to the top of the South Downs at Pyecombe.

In this task he fulfilled expectations by proving second best, beaten only by the Cambridge Harrier. But what of the last stage? We wonder if anyone is more surprised than K. B. O'Kell himself on examination of the result?

There remains but little more to say. The prospect of competing next year is not hopeless and with some little enthusiasm among a few more members, who might forego two or three weeks of the "Track," we shall find that we can show vast improvement on this years performance, satisfactory as it may seem as a first attempt.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS.

On referring to the review of the prospects of our ten mile Cross-Country Championship and twenty mile Walk, contained in our last issue, it will be found that these events eventually resulted, as was expected, by the successes of the respective holders.

H. E. Footer scored his second win in the run, in time a matter of some nine seconds slower than that of the previous year, although this time more closely pressed by his "runner up" A. D. Pyer, winner in 1923 and 1924.

F. Rickards third victory in the walk was overwhelming. On a day by no means favourable he won by a margin of twelve minutes in the time of 2 hours 47 minutes 49 seconds. Over five minutes faster than last year and only 33 seconds slower than his time of 1924 when recording his first success in more favourable circumstances.

W. J. Hawker who finished second was making a welcomed reappearance after a lapse of some two years. Hawker has done good service for the Club on the Road for many years but has not been

exactly fortunate in Club Championships. It would appear that at the time when he was at his best, the Club was not possessed of the Trophies it has to-day. In consequence, although old records show that he won a Club 8 mile Championship at Raynes Park in 1913 we doubt if he received any intrinsic reward.

TRACK MEETING.

The first Club Track Meeting was held at Battersea, on Saturday, April 24th. The weather was cold and dull, and a heavy track was against fast times. In spite of this, however, some good form was shown. The outstanding feature being M. E. Odell's win in the 100 yds. handicap from Scratch.

The 880 handicap brought out the biggest field of the day, 31 actually competing of an original entry of 36. This race went to A. Martin, who thus repeated the feat of H. J. Coxhead last year, by following up a win in the 3 mile Road Race with this success. A. E. Chorley showed considerable improvement to finish second, whilst W. H. Williams, who was "well expected," was a close up third.

Eleven started in the 2 mile walk which went to J. B. Carne off 145, in the fast time of 14 mins. 50 secs.

Entering the straight Martin dashed into the lead and in spite of the efforts of Chorley, Williams and H. W. On Easter Monday, S. A. Manning might have been seen hurrying from Norwich to Ipswich, a distance of some 42 miles, intent only on arriving before any other of those who were competing in the Annual Walk of the Suffolk Road Walking Association for the T. E. Hammond Challenge Cup.

This was Manning's first attempt since his win of 1923 when setting up the existing record of 7 hours 1 minute. It may be recalled that the weather was like that of Summer and hot. In consequence of this and the retirement of his most dangerous antagonist at half distance Manning very wisely took matters easy and comfortable as possible and was content to stroll home the winner by some 18 minutes, in 7 hours 21 minutes 31 seconds.

Previous to this event he had set up a new record for the Felixstowe to Ipswich and back walk of 2 hours 53 minutes 20 seconds. This was nearly 15 minutes inside the previous best.

Both fine performances by a fine fellow who will pardon the heading suggested by the first half of one of his starting points.
